#### Home Insurance

Millbrook First Nation's insurance covers the structural costs of CMHC houses and band-owned homes on reserve. Please note that the contents inside the homes, including the appliances, are not insured by the First Nation. It is important to protect your belonging and one way to do that is to consider purchasing home insurance for the contents of your home. This became apparent after the recent flooding of basements that occurred in Millbrook's communities last month. If Millbrook members are interested in home contents insurance, they will be responsible and it will not be covered by the First Nation. Questions? #### **Housing Inspections**

The Housing Department has been working collaboratively with other organizations and government agencies with the hopes of obtaining funding for housing repairs. In order to be eligible for the housing repairs, housing inspections will be mandatory for the funding.

Those who contact the Housing Department to be added to the list will be first priority, but it's mandatory for all houses to be inspected. Anyone who doesn't answer the door for their scheduled appointment will be dropped down to the end of the list.

#### **Millbrook's Security Services**

Millbrook's security team is responsible for keeping Millbrook's community safe and secure. They work around the clock and are on call 24 hours a day. Their duties include patrolling the neighbourhoods of Millbrook and Cole Harbour because having a physical presence in the community is a deterrent for minor damage or other unsavoury activities. They are trained to identify unusual activity and pay attention to detail to reduce risks to the community. In addition, they observe and report suspicious activity that may be criminal.

If a community member is in danger or witnesses criminal activity, it is important that they call 911 or the local Millbrook or Cole Harbour, Sheet Harbour detachment of the RCMP. Please note that the security team cannot report incidents on your behalf.

#### **Things to remember:**

- 1. Applications only need submitted once a year between April 1- March 31 of every year unless information needs to be updated.
- 2. All applications expire after March 31<sup>st</sup> of each year.
- 3. All applications MUST have release form attached. They need to be signed, witnessed, and dated.
- 4. All applications MUST have all legal documents attached. ALL applications that are submitted should have documents attached or any updated information. (Custody agreements, registration or medical, etc.)
- 5. Please fill in all the necessary information that applies to you. Do not leave any information blank as we go by the information given on the most recent application.

#### Millbrook First Nation Takes a Journey With Mi'kmaq Food and Tradition

# CULTURAL FOOD SHOWCASE WALKING TOUR FIRST OF ITS KIND ORGANIZED BY HEALTH CENTRE TO SHARE KNOWLEDGE, HIGHLIGHT TIES TO THE LAND

MILLBROOK, N.S. — A recent cultural showcase tour in Millbrook First Nation brought people on a knowledge-sharing journey of celebrating tradition with comforting Mi'kmaq food along the way.

The gathering on Oct. 18 was for community members and invited guests of all ages, including students of the Nova Scotia International Student program. To open, the Iron Tide drum group performed with dancers Patience Sylliboy and Tehya Milliea, and elder

Patsy Paul-Martin gave a prayer in the Mi'kmaq language and then English. Hearty prepared food of cultural and nutritional significance was shared at each stop of the walking tour.

Tehya, who is 17 and wants to become a journalist to share Indigenous stories, said she always loves listening to Gerald Gloade. The artist and cultural educator shared the Muin (bear) and the seven bird hunters story, represented by stars in the night sky, and how it relates to harvesting and hunting seasons throughout the Mi'kmaw moons.

"I want to acquire as much knowledge as I can as I get older," said Tehya. "I don't feel comfortable teaching too much right now. I feel like I have so much more to learn. But in the future, I hope to teach people like they do."

While filleting a fish from her home community of Listuguj Mi'gmaq First Nation,

Cheyenne Issac-Gloade talked about the hard work it takes to fish, including setting nets and being out early on the water. She loved growing up with her grandfather's salmon soup – which contained a big head – and she helped her family with fishing as young as she could.

In 1981, 500 provincial police and fishery officers opposed to their fishing raided her community despite it being their inherent right.

"We stood up to the government for those treaty rights that are so important," said Issac-







Gloade. "(Mi'kmaq people) still fight today, a very similar sort of fishing wars down in Digby ... so I'm really proud to be from that community."

The tour also showcased the powwow grounds and Woodchip Trail, which are of historical significance to Millbrook. Traditionally, many community members grew up hunting in those woods. Millbrook youth support worker Colin Bernard said that they are inviting people to share their opinions about the future of the trail as they further develop and make it more

accessible. The 2023 North American Indigenous Games, happening in Halifax, will be holding its archery event there in Millbrook.

"They looked at our trail, they thought it was beautiful and ideal for an archery competition," said Bernard. "And it's the first time in NAIG history that they're going to be able to shoot a target and allow family members across North America to see their child actually shoot a target (and) have it livestreamed."

At the showcase, Garrett Gloade showed how to set a rabbit snare.

"I've had family members who are hunters who are trappers, fishermen and so on, but they

never really decided to teach me," said Garrett. "So throughout COVID it weighed heavily on the mental health of individuals. And especially me as a powwow singer, the one thing that I was able to connect to culturally was gone, with not being able to gather."

That led to the founding of a men's mental health group in Millbrook, which found commonality in that loss of knowledge and banded together to learn fishing and hunting like their ancestors did. When Garrett caught his very first rabbit, it was fresh and still warm when they gave it to Jane Abram, an elder in Millbrook.





Also showcased was the traditional game of Waltes, with Millbrook's very own Waltes champions Tammy Bernard and Priscilla Martin. Previously oppressed by white settlers, it has made a fierce comeback in recent years and is part of the Nova Scotia Mi'kmaw Summer Games. It involves bringing down a bowl, made from a tree burl, with enough force to flip flat-shaped dice made from moose bone. There are three sticks representing old women who are fighting over a man, represented by another stick, and 51



additional counting sticks. Later on, sticks end up in a player's hair as points are scored. The game can go on for hours, said Bernard, who learned from her grandmother at the age of six.

Tehya said that she loved how well-spoken everyone was and that she has great respect for the elders present.

"Elders, they're the keepers of knowledge and how our culture survives," said Tehya. "And listening to them speak and learning their teachings is how to carry on our culture and how to keep on sharing it with other people."

Tehya's mother, Corrina Milliea, was inspired by the Benjamin Bridge winery's annual Beyond Terroir event honouring Mi'kmaq people and Glooscap First Nation with food and teachings. The inaugural event was organized by the Millbrook Health Centre staff in conjunction with community partners. They hope

to bring it back during next year's Mi'kmaq History Month.


